Good News from La Quinta!

My last article, in the September 2019 Siren issue, addressed MMOC's financial status and subsequent longevity. I felt that if we made no changes to our financial bottom line that we would have a finite number of years left until we would have to close the doors to the MMOC. I encouraged anyone able and interested to attend the convention in La Quinta where we would roll up our sleeves and deal with the issues. Apparently, that plea fell of deaf ears, or blind eyes, as we only had the usual twenty-two suspects (I mean attendees) show up. The good news is those that did attend made it clear they wanted to continue the MMOC, and in order to do that expenses would have to be cut. At the Board

of Director's meeting, Monday morning on September 9th, we agreed to make the following expense reductions:

- Change our bookkeeper
- Change our tax preparer
- Hold board meetings online
- Shutdown the MMOC store
- Print Convention Booklets in-house
- Reduce annual allotment of window decals from two to one

Implementing these six strategies will save us over \$11,000 annually, which brings our income and expenses to nearly a net-zero. Depending on our membership numbers (see later in this issue) there is no reason MMOC cannot continue for at least another twenty years. Having said that, at some

point the current Board and staff will no longer be able to, or wish to, perform the tasks they currently perform. The current Board of Directors has exceeded their terms.



Fortunately, all have agreed to stay in their current positions until replacements express an interest in assuming those roles. If any

of you have an interest in being a Director please do not hesitate to contact me or the other directors for information.

27TH ANNUAL RIDE - THE DALLES, OREGON

This years MMOC ride is bringing us to the Columbia River Gorge, Oregon. The Columbia River Gorge has been called as one of the most scenic areas in America for motorcycle riding with great curvy roads that are rated for all riders except a novice. I mapped out 4 different round trip routes averaging about 150 miles per day covering the areas near the Dalles. The different routes include rides that have scenic roads around Mt Hood, a ghost town, views of the high desert area and curves.

Our base for this ride will be at the Cousin's Country Inn and Restaurant in The Dalles, Oregon. Some of you might remember we stayed there in 2018. After enjoying the roads and the town of The Dalles we will leave heading west for the Evergreen Air Museum in McMinnville Oregon. We will spend Thursday night in Woodburn, OR.



I have reserved 10 rooms at each hotel. Make sure to mention Municipal Motorcycle Officers of California (or MMOC) and/or my name when making reservations. State Highway Patrol Organized

Cataloging the CHP Museum's archives is often like a treasure hunt. Cleaning, photographing, and describing each item and entering them in the database is a timeconsuming job that is rewarded when hidden gold is found. Recently we came across a group of ten publications. They are entitled, "California Highways and Public Works." They were the "Official Journal of the Department of Public Works, State of California." Back in the day, "The Department" was the Department of Public Works and "Division" was the Division of Motor Vehicles. The CHP was a part of just the Motor Vehicle Division.

One issue that caught my eye is from December 1929. It has an article announcing the formation of a statewide highway patrol. This new CHP would consist of approximately 350 men of all ranks engaged in enforcing the provisions of the California Vehicle Act. About one third would be for night patrol work. For that innovative mission, automobiles were purchased because the use of motorcycles at night was deemed hazardous. Officers were to be doubled up and sawed-off shotguns provided to confront the criminals found on the roadways at night.

Prior to 1929, traffic officers were hired by the county. The number of officers would vary depending on how many vehicles were registered in each county. At the inception of the CHP, pay varied from \$150 to \$500...a month. With a statewide CHP in place, a new pay scale was put in place that would be the standard statewide. District Inspectors re-

ceived \$225 to \$285 per month. Captains \$225 to \$250 and Patrolmen \$175 to \$225. Counties were reluctant to give up control to a state force, and perhaps there was a little reluctance to have a non-local group of officers in the counties, so officers were hired from lists given to the state by the county supervisors, and out-of-area assignments



would be temporary assignments only and all officers would return to their home counties.

A standard uniform specification was adopted "in which every detail down to a buttonhole is described." That may be the motto of the present day Uniform Committees. Of course, smoking was not allowed on duty because "Nothing looks worse than to see a man in uniform trying to direct traffic with a cigarette or cigar in his mouth."

Elsewhere, in the journal is a letter from the Women's Christian Temperance Union proclaiming they are "one in spirit with temperance and law enforcement," praising

the creation of the CHP. Kind of an antique MADD. There's also a letter commenting on how well the new force handled the traffic "emergency" at the big game between Stanford and the University of California. Another article notes there were 80 airplanes parked near the stadium by people who wished to avoid traffic congestion.

The rest of the publication is filled with reports on new roads being built and the most up-to-date ways to convert dirt roadways into paved roads. The idea of building a bridge from Oakland to San Francisco is being explored. There is also an interesting report rejecting an idea to build a San Gabriel dam on the river above L.A. as an unsafe venture. Ten years later, two dams were built.



We now have "Zelle"

In addition to paying for annual membership, cioppino feed and the annual convention with a check or PayPal you can now pay with "Zelle". "Zelle" is a secure way to pay directly from your bank to Chase, MMOC's bank. It is more secure than PayPal since you are not using a third party. Also, MMOC is not charged any fees, whereas with PayPal, we are charged a percentage of each transaction. Simply go into your bank account and find your "Zelle" payment method. For instance, my Wells Fargo has an option in the "Pay & Transfer" column that indicates "Send Money with Zelle". I click on there and get this screen .



The first time you do this you will need to set up MMOC as the recipient of the money. When prompted, use my email address, dwayne@mmoc.org. That is all that is needed. If you do use "Zelle" please indicate in the "memo" section for the purpose (Convention, dues, cioppino) of your payment. If there isn't a "memo" section please send me a short email with the information. Since this is new to most of us, please contact me if you have any questions.


Larry L. Lucas


Larry was selected as the MMOC's Rider of the Year in 1997. You may recognize the above center photo as it is on the main page of the MMOC website.


