## **MMOC's Future**

#### The Onus Is On You!



At the General Membership meeting, held on 13 September 2021 in Carson City, there was a discussion regarding agenda Item #9, The Future of MMOC. I passed out a copy of MMOC goals from a 1930 publication as a reference for discussion. In part, it stated in 1928, MMOC was formed with many goals and purposes, including motor officer safety & well-being, and to assist the state legislature in formalizing statewide traffic laws.

A once vibrant organization, with three to four-thousand members, it has continually dwindled down to a membership currently in the neighborhood just north of three-hundred members. I know, from the handwritten notes on membership renewal notices I receive, that many of you are very proud to be members of this storied organization and are very thankful for the work and time our volunteers put in to keep us afloat.

MMOC no longer has any input into traffic safety laws and have truly little contact with police agencies and their traffic units. We have become a social organization with one charitable goal of donating to the "Every 15 Minutes" campaign. Our annual convention is attended by basically the same twenty core people, and the same ten core people for the annual motorcycle ride. The current Board of Directors, which usually are two-year terms, are going on five-plus years. Three members, and one unofficial member, manage ten-plus jobs and duties within the organization.

A healthy organization needs to evolve with a constant influx and rotation of new leaders and fresh

ideas. Over the years we have asked for members to step up and become directors and help with the duties within the organization. Few have stepped up. We are a fiscally sound organization. While obtaining new members will always be a long-term goal if MMOC is to continue into the next decade, in the present it is not a priority. What is a priority is the transition into new leadership with the current membership.

At the General Membership meeting we discussed how long someone, with no working knowledge of our organization's inner workings, would need to serve as a director to ascend through the vice-president position and into the President's position. We felt, at a minimum, this would take a two-year period. During that period, the director would attend on-line Zoom board meetings and would be expected to attend the annual convention. It would also be advisable for a new director to attend any other MMOC function, at least once, to have some working knowledge of said activity. I will expound more this and other MMOC duties/jobs in the section after this article.

Upon completion of discussion about the future of MMOC a motion was made by Dennis Brown and seconded by George Firchow that stated:

"That, at a minimum, if three new directors are not elected by 2026 then MMOC will cease operation by 2028".

(For clarification, in order to serve the 2026 session a Director must be voted to the Board at the September 2025 Convention)

The vote was put to the attending membership, which passed by a majority, with one dissenting vote. I spoke to the dissenting voter whose only opposition was the period stated in the motion feeling that the deadline for new directors should have been sooner than 2026.

## MMOC's Future (cont.)

So, please ruminate over what you have just read. The ONUS is on you, the membership. Some feel the organization has run its course. If you feel otherwise, it's time to step up. If you have any questions please contact me and we can discuss at length.

#### **NEVADA to CALI - WESTBOUND & DOWN**

The 2022 MMOC ride will start on Sunday night July 10<sup>th</sup> in Carson City, NV. This year we will meet and spend the night at the Gold Dust West Casino Carson City. The Gold Dust offers an outdoor pool and an on-site restaurant. This Hotel must be Booked by <u>June 1, 2022</u> for quoted rate.

Monday morning, we will head south on 395 to Lone Pine Ca. and the Dow Villa Hotel and its 24 hour a day outdoor pool awaits us. There are many restaurants and a bar nearby to choose from. The Museum of Western Film History is a 4-minute walk from the motel. (https://www.lpmuseum.org/) Seasons restaurant is highly rated and within walking distance with a well-stocked bar. https://seasonslonepine.club/

Tuesday leave Lone Pine riding south on 395 to Highway 178 west to Highway 155 west (both great motorcycle roads with combination of 25 mph turns and long sweepers). We will ride around Lake Isabella until we get on Highway 155 when we will ride to the Saddle Sore Saloon (661) 536-8114 for lunch. There are 3 gas stations near Lake Isabella on Highways 178 and 155. All of the articles I have read about riding on highways 178 and 155 have stated the roadway surface is in great shape and lots of fun riding. After lunch we will ride Highway 155 west to Woody Road then southwest to Bakersfield Hill House Best Western. It has a Pool, Bar and Restaurant on site.

Wednesday we leave Bakersfield in the morning heading west on Highway 58 (another great motorcycle road) to 101 Stopping at J's County Kitchen 22412 El Camino Real

Santa Margarita (805) 365-7022 for lunch. Then finishing our ride at the Santa Maria Inn. Very nice hotel, perhaps too nice for us, with a Bar and Restaurant on site with a good menu. There are also other restaurants nearby.

Thursday's ride is to San Luis Obispo. Check in at the Inn at San Luis Obispo, with an on-site outdoor pool. We can take the shuttle to downtown SLO to enjoy the Farmers Market and lots of BBQ.
